

Mr. Donoho submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the governor and council be requested to cause a national salute to be fired at sunrise, noon, and at sunset, on the twenty-third day of this month, in commemoration of the birth of the illustrious Washington, the twenty-second being on Sunday.

Which being read the first, and by a special order, the second time, was unanimously assented to, and sent to the senate for concurrence.

Mr. M-Mahon of Allegany, offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Joseph Dilly, esquire, such sum of money as may be due to William Price, esquire, late a member of this house, and allowed him on the journal of accounts; and that the said Joseph Dilly, esquire, account with the administrator or administratrix of the said deceased, for the sum received.

Which being read the first, and by a special order, the second time, was assented to, and sent to the senate for concurrence.

Mr. Gantt submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the clerk of the council immediately advertise in the newspapers printed in the city of Annapolis, and two of the newspapers printed in the city of Baltimore, and in one of the newspapers printed in the city of Frederick, and one in Easton, for proposals for the printing and stitching the usual number of copies of the laws, passed at the present session of the legislature, embracing an index and marginal notes, and within twenty days from the passage of this resolution, he shall contract for said printing on the best terms he can obtain; Provided, that the contractor or contractors shall enter into bond, with security to be approved of by the said clerk, to deliver the said laws at the city of Annapolis within thirty days from the date of the contract.

Which being read the first time, was, on motion of Mr. Gantt, ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Rogerson, chairman of the committee therein mentioned, delivered the following reports:
