Hicks, Steele, Hardcastle, Goldsborough, Evans, Gale, Comegys, Creswell, Wootton, Gantt, Edelen, Semmes, Wells, Claude, Grason, Wright, Oldson, Sudler, Roach, Boyer, Hutcheson, Hitch, Thomas, of Frederick, Dorsey, Kinzer, Shriver, Johns, Moores, Hope, Burchenal, Keene, Orrell, Crawford, Hunt, Nicholas, Yoe, Brookhart, Witmer, Donnelly, Harding, Gittings, Willson, White, McMahan, and Swan.

And a quorum, consisting of a majority of the whole number of delegates declared and returned to have been duly elected as before mentioned, being convened;

On motion of Mr. McMahan, they proceeded to qualify agreeably to law, as members of the House of Delegates.

All the attending delegates above mentioned, having then severally qualified in the presence of each other, as members of the House of Delegates, before Edward Dubois, Esqr. one of the justices of the peace of the State of Maryland, for Anne-Arundel County, in the manner and form required by the constitution and form of government, and the laws of said State, and of the United States, they took their respective seats in the House accordingly.

On motion by Mr. McMahan, the members present adjourned until tomorrow morning ten o'clock.

## TUESDAY, December 29th, 1829.

The members who attended yesterday, assembled this day according to adjournment.

Messrs. Beckett, Turner, of Calvert, Denny, and Sutton, who have been declared and returned as delegates duly elected to the General Assembly, as aforesaid, also appeared, and having severally qualified in the manner and form prescribed by law, before Edward Dubois, esquire, a justice of the peace for Anne Arundel county, took their seats as members of the House of Delegates.
