dispose of the funds of the state to the best possible advantage.

Therefore, resolved by this House, That no token of respect shall be paid to any officer or citizen of this state, during the remainder of this session, other than a vote of thanks, for the services which they may have rendered.

Which being twice read,

Mr. Orrell moved to amend the resolution by inserting the word "military" between the words "any officer," in the second line thereof.

Pending the question thereon and the debate which arose, Mr. Steele moved a reference of the proposed preamble and resolution, and also the amendment, to the first day of June next.

And the question on this motion of reference being put, It was resolved in the affirmative.
