Samuel Turner, Henry Page and William Potter, Esquires, having been elected the council to the governor of this state, we propose that a joint letter be written by the president of the senate and the speaker of this house, and forwarded by mail, to each of the gentlemen elect, to notify them of their election, and requesting their immediate attendance at the seat of government.

Mr. Teackle reported a bill, entitled, An act supplemental to an act, entitled. An act to promote the preservation, improvement and increase, of shell fish in this state; which was read, and made the order of the day for Friday next. And

Mr. Brookhart reported a bill, entitled, An act to abolish all and every such parts of the constitution and form of government in this state, as relates to the appointment of the offices of register of wills and clerks of the county courts of this state; which was read.

Mr. Turner submitted the following orders; which were severally read and adopted:

Ordered, That the committee on inspections be instructed to inquire into the propriety and expediency of appointing an additional inspector of flour in the city of Baltimore, and report by bill or otherwise.

Ordered, That the committee on ways and means be directed to inquire into the propriety of modifying the fines imposed by the license law, passed in the year 1827, and the supplements thereto, so as to leave it discretionary with the judges of the respective courts in this state to impose such fines as as they may deem proper and right, not exceeding the present fine, and not less than the price of the license.
