And Mr. Purnell, from the committee on divorces, reported a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Bolton Jackson, of the city of Baltimore.

Which said bills were severally read.

Mr. Teackle reported a bill, entitled, An act to repeal a part of an act passed at December session 1829, chapter 106, and for other purposes; which was read the first, and by special order the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill from the senate, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Powhatan Manufacturing Company of Maryland.

Also the bill, entitled, An act to fix the compensation of jurors in Kent county.

And the bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act relating to insolvent debtors in the city and county of Baltimore, were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed.

Mr. Tilghman, from the select committee to whom was referred the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to explain the second section of the act, entitled, An act to provide for the support of schools in Queen-Anne's county, and to withdraw the funds from the Centreville academy, reported the same with the following amendments, viz.

Amendments proposed.

1st. After the word "have," strike out the word "no," and insert the word "full."

2d. Same line strike out the word "whatever."

3d. Strike out the words "trustees of the Centreville Academy in," and insert "commissioners of the school fund for."

4th. In the 5th line strike out from the word "as," to the end of the line, and insert "directed by the said second section."

Which amendments were read.

The bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company for erecting a bridge over the Sassafra river, at the place where the public ferry is now kept, from Fredericktown in Cecil county, to Georgetown in Kent county.

The bill, entitled, An act to provide for the fuller administration of justice in equity cases in Allegany county.
