Mr. Kershner reported a bill entitled, An act for the benefit of M. A. Ringgold and children.

Mr. Montgomery reported a bill, entitled, An act appointing commissioners to mark and bound the lot on which the house for public worship of the Baptist Society of Harford county stands, and to vest the title to said land in the trustees of said society.

Mr. Stockett reported a bill, entitied, An act regulating the manner of levying on the assessable property in Anne-Arundel county for the support of Primary Schools in said

county.

Mr. Harding reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act to provide for the purchase of the office papers formerly belonging to the surveyor's office of Montgomery county, passed at December session 1829, chapter 126,

Mr. Lee, reported a bill, entitled, An act to distribute the school fund of Montgomery county.

Mr. Nicholas reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorise a subscription to the capital stock of the Baltimore and Susquehannah Rail Road Company.

Which said bills were severally read.

Mr. Duvall from the select committee, made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate, entitled, An act for the benefit of Milo Mason of the army of the United States; which was read.

Mr. Nicholas from the committee, delivered a report of the joint committee to which were referred the memorials of sundry citizens of this state, in relation to certain obstructions in the river Susquehannah; which was read and ordered to be printed.

Mr. Tilghman from the committee on ways and means, made an unfavourable report on the bill reported by Mr. M'Elfresh, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, and keepers of ordinaries, and others, passed at December session 1827, chapter 117.

On motion by Mr. Ely, leave of absence was granted Mr. Turner for a few days.

Mr. Lee, from the committee on internal improvement, reported a bill, entitled, An act authorising the commissioners of the town of Havre-de-Grace, in Harford county, to build a wharf in the river Susquehanna, at the termination of St. Clair street, otherwise known by the name of Brownis point, in said town.
