The question was then taken on the adoption of the message? Resolved in the affirmative, and the message sent to the senate.

The senate has received your message, and for the reasons assigned by your honourable body, accedes to the proposition to extend the session.

On motion by Mr. Merrick, the bill reported by him, entitled, An act to prevent horse-racing cock-fighting, and betting on elections, in Washington county, was taken up for consideration, and read the second time;

When Mr. Brookhart moved to strike out the enacting clause of the bill.

On the question being put, it was determined in the negative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass?
