The testimony in the case has been taken agreeably to law, and in our apprehension clearly proves, that at the time of the reunion of Mr. Gittings with the therein named Elizabeth, there was good reason to believe that her husband by a former marriage, was still living, and that there is no tribunal but that of the general assembly that can declare the separation petitioned for, null and void.
