

On motion by Mr. Teackle,

Ordered, That so much of the Executive Communication as relates to the demise of the late Governor, Daniel Martin, Esquire, be referred to a select committee of seven members, to act in conjunction with such committee as the Senate may appoint for that purpose.

That so much thereof, as relates to supplies of stationary, and to an index to the laws by Gideon Pearce, to the laws and maps of States and Territories, be referred to the joint committee on the Library.

That so much thereof, as relates to the State's Tobacco Inspection Warehouses, and to the public stocks, be referred to the standing committee on Ways and Means.

That so much thereof, as relates to the Penitentiary, be referred to the standing committee on Crimes and Punishments.

That so much thereof, as relates to the report of the Adjutant General relative to the Militia and Public Arms, be referred to the standing committee on the Militia.

That so much thereof, as relates to the "causes and circumstances which have created an anxiety in relation to the condition and extent of military supplies," and to obstructions in the Susquehannah River, be referred to the standing committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice.

That so much thereof, as relates to internal improvements, be referred to the standing committee on that subject.

That so much thereof, as relates to communications from the Executives of the several States of Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Delaware and Virginia, be referred to a select committee of seven members.

That so much thereof, as relates to education, be referred to the standing committee on that subject—And that the Speaker appoint the several select committees herein ordered.

On motion by Mr. Parran,

Ordered, That the standing committee on Elections be instructed to inquire into the expediency of holding on the same day throughout the state, the election for delegates to the general assembly, sheriffs of their respective counties, commissioners in the counties where they elect them, representatives in congress, electors of senate, and electors of president and vice president of the United States, and report the same to this house.
