Mr. Moores submitted the following resolution;

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the commissioners of Harford county be, and they are hereby authorised to allow to the crier of Harford county court, such compensation as in their judgment they may conceive just and reasonable for services heretofore rendered said court as crier while engaged in chancery business, provided, the compensation shall not exceed two dollars per day for each and every day he may have attended said court, to be levied and paid as other county charges.

Which was read the first, and by special order the second time, and passed.

The House adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

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MONDAY, January 9th, 1832.

The House met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

Thomas Rogerson, Esq. a delegate returned for Charles county, appeared, qualified and took his seat.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise the clerk of Harford county court, to record the deeds therein mentioned.

Also, the bill, entitled, An act for the despatch of business in Baltimore county court;

And, the resolution in favour of the crier of Harford county court; were sent to the senate.

Mr. Ely presented the petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying the better organization of primary schools in said county; which was read and referred to the committee on Education.

Mr. Holmes presented the petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying for a law providing for the erection of a bridge over the Great Gunpowder, at Jessop's mill; which was read and referred to Messrs. Holmes, Ely, Turner of Baltimore, Stansbury and Johns.

Mr. Hunt presented the petition of Mary Willson, of the city of Baltimore, praying for a divorce from her husband, John Willson; which was read and referred to the committee on divorces.
