

By the House of Delegates,

January 26th, 1832.

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Levy Court of Anne Arundel county, be, and they are hereby directed, to levy such a sum on said county, as the county court may estimate to be the value of a slave of Samuel Graham, of said county, convicted of burglary, and sentenced to the penitentiary as a freeman, by the name of Josh Williams, and the said sum is hereby directed to be paid by the collector of the tax of Anne Arundel county, to the said Samuel Graham.

*Further Resolved,* That the governor be, and he is hereby authorised and requested, to order by such agent as he may appoint, the sale of said negro, requiring of the purchaser, bond with security, that the said negro shall be transported out of the state, and directing said agent to pay to the collector of the tax of Anne Arundel county, such sum as may be raised on the sale of said negro.

Which were read.

Mr. Lyles, chairman of the committee on inspections, made a favorable report on the bill from the senate, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to authorise the governor and council of Maryland, to appoint the inspectors of flour for this state, passed at December session, 1825, chapter 174,

Mr. Hall reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company in Funkstown, in Washington county, under the name of the Funkstown Juvenile Librarian Society.

Mr. Mitchell, chairman of the committee on divorces, reported a bill, entitled, An act to divorce John Barks, and Mary his wife.

Mr. Brawner, chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Elizabeth Dodson Hopkins, Theodore Denny Hopkins, and Hester Maria Hopkins, of Talbot county, children of Eliza Hopkins, of said county;

Also, reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the recording of certain deeds therein mentioned, for the benefit of John Norris, of Frederick county.

Mr. Turner, of Baltimore, reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, an act to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads in Baltimore county, passed at December session, 1825;
