money and rebuild a bridge over Herring Run, on the road leading from Baltimore to Belle Air, on what is called the Belle Air road;

The resolution appropriating the sum of eight hundred

dollars for the use of the state library;

And the resolution in favour of William W. Higgins and

Charles E. Tilden—were sent to the senate.
