

Mr. Willson, of Montgomery, obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act, to provide for the repair of public roads in Montgomery county, passed at December session 1826, chapter 227; ordered that Messrs. Willson, of Montgomery, Gittings and Harding, report the same.
