

An act to regulate sales by public auction—reported the same with the following amendments:

*Amendments Proposed.*

After the word “states,” in the last line of the 3d section, insert the following:—“or are distrained for rent, or sold in virtue of any writ of execution issued out of any court of this state, or of the United States, or under any decree in chancery;

In the 6th section, third line, strike out the words “by or under the authority,” and insert the following:—“in pursuance of a distress for rent, nor in virtue of any writ or decree as aforesaid.”

Which were read the first and second time by special order;

Mr. Moores moved to amend the first amendment, by adding at the end thereof, these words, “or order of the orphan’s court;”

Determined in the negative;

The said amendments were then assented to;

The bill was then read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Teackle, chairman of the committee on ways and means, submitted the following resolution:

By the House of Delegates,  
February 7th, 1832.

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the Western Shore, be and he is hereby authorised and required to deposit the monies received in payment of the revenue of this state in the Farmers’ Bank of Maryland, or in any other of the incorporated banks of the city of Baltimore, which shall agree to pay semi annually therefor, at a rate of interest not less than four per centum per annum, and in case that an arrangement to that effect, shall be concluded with any one of the incorporated banks in the city of Baltimore, it shall be the duty of the said treasurer, to authorise the cashier of such bank, to draw on him for the balance of cash received by him on the last monday of each and every month, commencing with the current month.*

Which was read.

Mr. Nicols reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorise Samuel Pattison, collector and administrator of Nathaniel Applegarth, late sheriff of Dorchester county, to complete his collections.
