Also, the resolution authorising the treasurer of the western shore, to pay to David Brookhart, for the use of Catharine Grove, widow of Daniel Grove, a revolutionary soldier, the balance of pension due him at the time of his death;

And, the resolution requiring the Armourer, to deliver over to Lieutenant Benjamin Seegar, of Queen Anne's county, a number of swords and pistols not exceeding fifty, of each, with appropriate accoutrements; were sent to the

Senate.

Mr. Nicols presented the memorial of sundry citizens of Dorchester county, praying for a more efficient militia law, so far as relates to Dorchester county; which was read and

referred to Messrs. Nicols, Travers and Wright.

Mr. Orrell presented the petition of sundry citizens of Caroline county, praying for an act in favour of the children of James Duc, late of the county aforesaid; which was read and referred to Messrs. Orrell, Charles and Jones, of Caroline.

Mr. Brawner presented the petition of John B. Norris, of Charles county, praying that a sum of money may be levied upon the assessable property of said county, to aid in sup-

port of himself and children.

Mr. Lyles presented the petition of John Booth, of Prince George's county, praying to be placed on the pension list of said county; which were severally read, and referred to the committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessment.

Mr. Belt presented the petition of sundry citizens of Prince George's county, praying for a revaluation and reassessment of the real and personal property in said county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Belt, Gantt,

and Wootten.

Mr. Hunt presented the memorial of James Carey and others, of the city of Baltimore, relative to the gradual emancipation of slaves in this state.

Mr. Lake presented the petition of Salsbury Collins, of Dorchester county, praying to be compensated for a loss of

services of a negro man therein mentioned;

Which were read, and severally referred to the commit-

tee on grievances and courts of justice.

Mr. Gantt presented the petition of sundry citizens of Prince George's county, praying that a subscription of five hundred thousand dollars be made by the state to the general stock of the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road Company, to be applied to the road between the cities of Baltimore
