By the House of Delegates,

March 14th, 1832.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have received your message, accompanied by a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the promotion of internal improvement, by the construction of a rail road from Baltimore to Washington.

The protracted period of the session, does not admit of a matured consideration of the modifications suggested by your honorable body, and believing that the bill contains several beneficial provisions, we again send it to you, and request your reconsideration of its contents.

The speaker appointed Mr. Handy on the committee on elections, to supply the vacancy occasioned by the absence of Mr. Pearce.

Mr. Handy, from the committee on elections, to which was referred the bill from the senate, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to reduce into one the several acts of assembly, respecting elections, and to regulate such elections, reported favorably thereon;

Which was read;

The said bill was then read the second time by special order;

Mr. Roberts moved to amend said bill, by striking out after the word 'district,' first section, thirteenth line, to the end of said section, and insert in lieu thereof, the following:—

'Harford, Cecil, Kent and Caroline counties, shall constitute a fourth district, and be entitled to elect one elector, Queen Anne's, Talbot, Dorchester, Worcester and Somerset counties, shall constitute a fifth district, and be entitled to elect two electors.'
