

The house then adjourned until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.

THURSDAY, January 3d, 1833.

The house met;—present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Benjamin L. Gantt, Esquire, a delegate returned for Prince George's county, appeared, qualified, and took his seat.

Mr. Richardson, of Caroline, presented a petition of William Jones, of Caroline county, a revolutionary soldier,—and

Mr. Bruff presented a petition of Charles Smith, of Talbot county, a soldier of the revolutionary war; severally praying to be placed on the pension roll;

Which were read and severally referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Hollman presented a petition of Elizabeth Pope and William C. Drury, of Washington county, praying the passage of an act for the sale of the real estate therein mentioned; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hollman, Heard, and Grove.

Mr. Carter presented a petition of Ann Chilton, William Francis Chilton, and James Chilton, of Caroline county, praying the passage of an act, for the sale of part of the real estate of William Chilton, deceased, for the benefit of his heirs; which was read and referred to Messrs. Carter, Charles, and Jump.

Mr. Worthington presented a petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore and Frederick counties, praying for an act, authorising the opening of a road therein mentioned; which was read and referred to Messrs. Worthington, Hammond, and Unkefer.

Mr. Lantz presented a petition of Anne Postlewait, of Allegany county, praying to be remunerated for the revolutionary services of her husband, Samuel Postlewait; which was read, and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Cottman presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Somerset county, in relation to the rebuilding a Court-house for said county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Cottman, Jones, and Dennis.

Mr. Teackle presented ten memorials and petitions of citizens of different counties, praying the establishment of
