

South Carolina ordinance, and the substitute proposed by Mr. Merrick; and after some time spent therein, the speaker resumed the chair; when Mr. Blakistone, the chairman, reported, that the said committee had, according to order, had the said report and substitute again under consideration; and having made some progress therein, directed him to ask leave to sit again; which leave was granted by the house.

The house then adjourned, until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, February 6th, 1833.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, the proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, an act to lay out and open a new road in Frederick and Baltimore counties;

The bill, entitled, an act to authorise the commissioners of Washington county, to appoint three persons to assess damages unto persons therein named, and other purposes therein mentioned;

The bill, entitled, an act to lay out and open a road in Cecil county;

The bill, entitled, an act to divorce Cassandra O'Brien; of the city of Baltimore, from her husband Hugh O'Brien,

And the message adopted by this house on yesterday, proposing to fix on the second day of March next, for the adjournment of the Legislature;—were sent to the senate.

Mr. Jenkins presented a petition of Samuel Poultney, and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying for the passage of an act to prevent the further extension of Liberty street, northerly, and so provide for the extension of Cathedral street, south, to Saratoga street, and thence to connect with Liberty street; which was read and referred to Messrs. Jenkins, Harper and Ely.

Mr. Pratt presented a memorial of Samuel Sutton, praying to be allowed to introduce into this state, certain negroes therein mentioned;

And, Mr. Willson presented a memorial of William Stropshire, praying for a special act to authorise him to remove a slave into this state from the state of Virginia;

Which were read, and severally referred to the committee on the colored population.
