

Mr. Jenkins reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, to reduce the width of a part of Holland street.

Mr. Milbourne reported a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, "An act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers;"

Mr. White reported a bill, entitled, An act to revive and amend an act, entitled, An act for the benefit of John L. Trundle;

Mr. Jenkins reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, to open and extend Silver street, in the City of Baltimore, easterly from Spring street, to Caroline street; And,

Mr. Hammond reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the Governor and Council, to appoint one Justice of the Levy Court, for each Election District, in Frederick county;

Which were severally read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Cottman reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Steam Company of Princess Anne; passed at December session, 1815, chapter 52; And,

Mr. Turner reported a bill, entitled, An act to confirm an act, passed at December session, 1831, chapter 232; altering and amending the constitution of this State, so far as relates to Election Districts in Baltimore county;

Which were severally read the first and second time, by special order, and passed.

On motion by Mr. George A. Thomas, the house resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of yesterday.

The previous question being called by Mr. Pratt, and demanded by a majority of the members present, the said previous question was put, viz: "shall the main question be now put?" it was determined in the negative.

The house then resumed the consideration of the amendments proposed by the committee of the whole house;

The 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th amendments proposed by the committee, were assented to.
