

Mr. Hambleton of Talbot, submitted the following message, which was read,

By the House of Delegates,
January 7th, 1835.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have received your message proposing to address a joint letter from the President of the senate and Speaker of the house of Delegates to the honorable Robert H. Goldsborough, informing him of his election as a Senator to represent this state in the Senate of the United States, and that the same be forwarded by express, and concur therein.

Mr. Larrimore moved to amend said message, by striking out the word "express," and inserting in lieu thereof "mail,"

Determined in the negative.

The said message was then read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The house then adjourned until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.

THURSDAY, January 8th 1835.

The House met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Bruff, presented a petition of Sarah Martin, widow of Doct. Ennals Martin, late of Talbot county deceased, praying that the pension allowed her late husband as a surgeon's mate in the Revolution, may be continued to her,

And, Mr. Jones of Balt. presented a petition of Sarah Roberts, of the city of Baltimore, widow of James Roberts, a revolutionary soldier, praying to be placed on the pension roll,

Which were severally read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Cushing, presented a petition of John W. Brown, of the city of Baltimore, praying for the remission of a forfeited recognizance,

Which was read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.

Mr. Weast, presented a petition of the members of the German Reformed and Evangelical Lutheran Congregations of Salems Church in Boonsborough Washington county, praying for a new charter,
