Which was read:

The hour of eleven having arrived, the house proceeded by ballot, to the election of Registers of Wills for Kent and Calvert counties, in conformity with arrangement made with the Senate for that purpose, and the ballots of the members being collected in the ballot box, it was sealed up and delivered to the committee appointed on the part of this House, to meet the committee on the part of the Senate, to count the joint ballot of both houses, and report the result; who having retired to the conference room, after a short time had elapsed, returned and reported, that on counting the joint ballot of both houses, they had found that there were altogether eighty four votes taken, of which number James F. Brown received sixty eight votes, as Register of Wills for Kent county, and James A. D. Dalrymple, received sixty seven votes, and that that there were twelve blank ballots, and three scattering.

Whereupon, it was declared and resolved in the house of delegates, that James F. Brown be, and he is hereby recommended to his excellency the Governor of Maryland, to be commissioned as Register of Wills for Kent county, and that James A. D. Dalrymple, be also recommended to his excellency to be commissioned as Register of Wills for Calvert county.

Which said bills were severally read the first and second time by special order, and passed.

And, Mr. Weast reported a bill, entitled, an act for the relief of the German Reformed and Lutheran congregations of Salem church in Boonsborough, Washington county.
