

FRIDAY, January 16th, 1835.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The Speaker announced the following message as having been received from the Senate on yesterday.

By the Senate,  
January 15th 1835.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We acknowledge the receipt of your message, proposing a joint committee, to investigate and report to the general assembly, the proceedings of the visitors and governors of St. John's college. We concur in the view of the message, and have nominated Messrs. Forrest, Mayer, and Hughiett, to join the gentlemen appointed by your honorable body.

Which was read.

Also, a letter from Thomas W. Veazey, Esq. accepting his appointment as a member of the Executive Council, endorsed, "referred to the consideration of the house of delegates;"

Which was read:

And returned the bill, entitled, an act for the relief of Margaret Dods, of Frederick county, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;"

Which amendment was twice read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill, entitled, an act for the relief of the German Reformed and Lutheran congregations of Salem Church, in Boonsborough, Washington county, was sent to the senate.

Also, the bill from the senate, entitled, an act relating to guardians and wards, was returned to the senate.

The Speaker laid before the house a communication from Thomas Finley, Esq. enclosing the memorial of the convention recently held at the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of promoting internal improvement;

Which was read and referred to the committee on internal improvement.

Also, a report from the clerk of Queen Anne's County Court, relative to the several sums of money paid by him into the Eastern Shore Treasury, within the year ending on the 30th of November;

Which was read and referred to the committee on ways and means.
