The priority of the United States, is well understood to be, in no degree affected by any such transfer—and the inequality adverted to, is therefore considered as subsisting. But in any or all of these suggestions, he certainly did not intend to be understood, and can see no just ground for understanding him, to question the solvency or ability of the Union Bank of Maryland.
