And, delivered a bill originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, an act to incorporate "the trustees of the education fund of the Baltimore Annual Conference,"

Which was read and referred to the committee on corporations,

Also, a bill, entitled; an act relating to the trial of ejectment causes in this state,

Also, a bill, entitled, an act concerning ejectments,

And, a bill, entitled, an act relating to the payment of the Crier and Bailiffs of Baltimore county court,

Which were severally read, and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.

On motion of Mr. Carpenter, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by Mr. Johns, chairman of the committee on divorces, entitled, an act to divorce William B. Everitt, of Kent county, from his wife, Emily Everitt, otherwise called Emily F. Everitt;

On motion of Mr. Welch, said bill was amended by striking out in the first section, fifth line, the word 'mutually';

On motion of Mr. Welch, said section was further amended by striking out the name of 'William B. Everitt,' and inserting in lieu thereof the word 'parties;'

On motion of Mr. Welch, said bill was further amended, by inserting after the word 'claiming,' in the fifth line, second section, these words; 'recovering and receiving immediately after the passage of this act.'

On motion of Mr. Welch, said section was further amended by inserting after the word 'Everett,' in the sixth line thereof, the following: 'in the same manner as if he were actually dead, and no divorce had been granted.'

On motion of Mr. Welch, said bill was further amended, by adding at the end thereof, the following: "or to prevent the recovery and collection, by any person or persons whatever, of any claims or demands against the said William B. Everitt, for board, support or maintenance of the said Emily F. Everitt, wherewith the said William B. Everitt may be heretofore chargeable."

The said bill was then read the second time as amended, and passed.

Mr. Jones, of Somerset, submitted the following order:
