

On motion of Mr. Brown,
The house then adjourned until to morrow morning, ten o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, January 6, 1836.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, with the exception of Mr. Bayly, who had leave of absence. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The message adopted by the house on yesterday, proposing that a joint letter be written by the President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Delegates, and forwarded by mail to each of the members of the Executive Council, notifying them of their election, and requesting their immediate attendance at the seat of Government, was sent to the Senate.

Mr. Brewer presented a petition of Elizabeth Mary White, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be remunerated for military lands due her father and uncle,

Which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Gough presented a petition of Reuben Forwood, of Harford county, praying to be placed on the pension roll of said county,

Which was read and referred to the committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessment.

And, Mr. Duvall presented a petition of Jacob Hape, of Frederick county, praying for the passage of an act, to authorise him to sell beyond the limits of the State, a certain negro slave therein mentioned,

Which was read and referred to Messrs Duvall, Ely, and Brookhart.

On motion of Mr. Brewer,

Ordered, that the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, enquire into the propriety of allowing to Mary Holland, widow of Edward Holland, a soldier of the revolution, a pension, in consideration of the services of her husband.

Mr. Matthews, asked the following leave,

Leave to bring in a bill, to authorise the clerk of Allegany county court, to take confession of judgment out of court, in certain cases,

Which was read,

And, on motion of Mr. Matthews, referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.
