The said bill was then read the first and second time by

special order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Darby reported a bill, entitled, an act to limit the sitting of the commissioners of the tax in Montgomery county.

And, Mr. Hambleton reported a bill, entitled, an act to extend the power of the commissioners for Talbot county, for the purposes therein named.

Which were severally read the first and second time by

special order, passed, and sent to the senate.

The resolution submitted by Mr. Ridgely, on the 8th inst. directing the treasurer of the Western Shore, to pay to the commissioners of the tax for Anne Arundel county, the sum dollars, to be by them applied to defraying the exof penses of arrest, prosecution, and conviction of the rioters on the Baltimore and Washington Rail Road, was taken up for consideration.

When on motion of Mr. Ridgely, said resolution was ordered to lie on the table.
