

tee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor and invite his attendance in the Senate Chamber to qualify as required by the constitution, reported that the committee had performed that duty, and they were instructed by him to say that he would attend in the Senate Chamber to day at 12 o'clock, to qualify agreeably to the constitution and form of government.

Mr. Dulany, chairman of the committee on insolvency, reported a bill, entitled, an act, for the relief of Allen Elder of the city of Baltimore;

Which was read the first and second time by special order, and passed.

Mr. Brookhart submitted the following order:

Ordered that the committee on insolvency be instructed to enquire into the expediency of passing a general law in regard to the non-residents, so as to prevent further special legislation on that subject;

Which was read,—and

On motion of Mr. McLean, ordered to lie on the table.

A deputation from the Senate being announced, Messrs. Claude and Osborn, members of that body, appeared within the bar, and acquainted the Speaker and the members of the House of Delegates, that in accordance with the joint invitations of both houses, which had been personally communicated to him, the Governor was then attending in the Senate Chamber, where the Senate requested the attendance of the Speaker with that of the other members of this house, to witness the qualification of the Governor.

The Speaker thereupon left the chair, and attended by the members of this house, went to the Senate Chamber where the Honorable Thomas W. Veazey, was duly qualified as Governor of the State of Maryland, in the presence of both houses, in the manner and form prescribed by the constitution and laws thereof.

The speaker attended by the members of the house returned and resumed the chair.

On motion of Mr. Carroll, of Baltimore county;

The house adjourned until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.
