

necessary to procure the sword, directed by the legislature to be presented to that meritorious officer; And, for the purpose of making an appropriation better suited to the present condition and situation of the family of the deceased, therefore,

Resolved, by the General Assembly of Maryland, that his Excellency the Governor, be requested to ascertain the value of the sword which was directed to be presented to Captain Jacob Schmuck, late of the United States army—under a resolution of the last General Assembly of Maryland, (No. 98,)—and to draw on the Treasurer of the Western Shore, for the amount thereof, and present the same to Ellen Schmuck, widow of Captain Jacob Schmuck aforesaid, or to pay the same to her or order, as the case may be, for the use and education of Catherine Schmuck, his daughter and only child.

Which was read the first and second time by special order, the report concurred in, and the resolution therein contained, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Ridgely, chairman of the committee on the militia, to which was referred the bill, reported by Mr. Richardson, entitled, an act for the establishment and regulation of the Baltimore City Guards, reported the same without amendment,

The said bill was then read the first and second time by special order.

Mr. Hearne, moved to amend said bill, by striking out in the second line twelfth section, the word "foreign,"

Determined in the negative.

The said bill was then passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Dulany, chairman of the committee on Insolvency, reported a bill, entitled, an act for the relief of Henry Eberhart of the city of Baltimore,

Which was read the first and second time by special order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Ridgely, asked the following leave,

Leave to bring in a bill, entitled, an act, for the benefit of the Patapsco Female Institute,

Which was read and referred to the committee on education.

The bill reported by Mr. Carpenter, chairman of the committee on divorces, entitled, an act to divorce Elizabeth Gibson, of the city of Baltimore, from her husband John Gibson, was taken up for consideration, when,

On motion of Mr. Carpenter, said bill was ordered to lie on the table.
