ceived, and by the Clerk to be made a matter of record and no slave or their descendants introduced into Maryland by virtue of the provisions of this act, shall be manumitted or become free in this State, unless the person so manumitting him or her, shall furnish sufficient means and cause him or her to be removed from this State,

Which was read.

On motion of Mr. Teackle, said amendment was amended, by adding at the end thereof these words, "as required by the existing laws of this State,"

The said amendment was then read the second time as

amended, and assented to,

The question was then put, shall the said bill pass as amended,

Resolved in the affirmative.

The Clerk of the Senate returned the bill, entitled, an act further to continue an act passed at November session, 1795, entitled, an act to incorporate an Insurance Company in Baltimore town, endorsed, "will pass," ordered to be engrossed.
