And the message in relation to St. John's College, Were sent to the senate.

Mr. Ely presented a petition signed by sisteen hundred citizens of Baltimore and Harford counties, praying the passage of a declaratory act, prohibiting the Baltimore and Port Deposit Rail Road Company, from erecting any bridge or other obstruction over any waters in Baltimore or Harford counties, below sloop navigation,

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Ely, Gough,

Suiton, Winder and Richardson.

Mr. Willis presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Baltimore and F'rederick counties, praying for a law to open a road from a certain point in Frederick county, to the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road in Baltimore county,

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Willis, Brown

and Hood.

Mr. Iglehart presented a petition of sundry citizens of Anne Arundel county, praying an alteration in the license law of this State.

Mr. McLean presented a memorial signed by 2100 citizens of the city of Baltimore, counter to the memorial of sundry citizens of the same place, praying for a change in the present license laws of this State.

Mr. McLean also presented a memorial of sundry traders and dealers in the city of Baltimore, counter to the memorial of sundry other citizens of the same place, praying for

a change in the present license laws of this State.

Mr. Richardson presented a memorial of Christian Keener, John McKin, Jr. Luke Tiernan & Son, Joseph W. Patterson and others, citizens of the city of Baltimore, praying for the incorporation of the Farmers and Planters Bank,

And, Mr. Worthington presented a petition of sundry citizens of Prince George's county, praying an alteration of

the license laws,

Which memorials were severally read and referred to the

committee on ways and means.

Mr. Richardson presented a petition of sundry citizens of the city of Baltimore, praying the passage of a law, directing the opening of Chatsworth street, agreeably to the act passed at December session, 1818,

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Richardson, Mc-

Lean, and Carroll, of Baltimore county.

Mr. Richardson also presented a petition of sundry citizens of the city of Baltimore, praying for the opening of an alley therein mentioned,
