The House adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 0'-clock.

THURSDAY, February 4th, 1836.

The House met. Present the same members as on yes-

terday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Matthews presented a petition of John R. Nourse, of the city of Washington, in the District of Columbia, praying the passage of an act to authorise him to bring certain slaves therein mentioned into this State,

And, Mr. Wharton presented a petition of J. Ross-Key, praying to be allowed to bring into this State, from the Dis-

trict of Columbia, a negro hoy therein named,

Which were severally read and referred to the committee

on the colored population

Mr. Ridgely presented a petition of Julia Rouark, of Anne Arundel county, (widow of James Rouark) a revolutionary soldier, praying to be placed on the pension roll,

Which was read and referred to the committee on pen-

sions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Wharton presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Washington county, praying the passage of a law, to call a convention to alter the Constitution of this State.

Mr. Brookhart presented a petition of sundry citizens of Washington county, praying the passage of a law, calling a convention to revise the State Constitution,

And, Mr. Nowland presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying for a reform in the State Constitution,

Which memorials were severally read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Sutton presented a petition of John Donahoo and Robert Gale, praying the passage of a law, to enable them to improve a tract of land in Harford county,

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Sutton, Nelson and Townsend,

And, Mr. McLean presented a petition of sundry citizens of the city of Baltimore, praying that the corporate powers of the said city, may be enlarged as to authorise a subscription on the part of the Mayor and City Council, to subscribe for stock of the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road
