Mr. Burchenal submitted the following resolution.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Governor and Council be, and they hereby are authorised and required from time to time to draw upon the Treasurer of the Western Shore for such advances of funds which they may deem to be necessary for defraying the expenses of the reconnaissance and survey authorised by resolution No. fifteen, of December session 1835, upon the requisition of the Commissioners authorised to act by said resolution—and also to draw for such sums as may be necessary to pay the cost of the survey of the route of the Annapolis and Potomac Canal,

Which was read the first and second time by special order, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Townsend presented a petition of a large number of citizens of Cecil county, praying a change in the law establishing Magistrates Courts.

Which was read, and referred to the select committee appointed on that subject.

Mr. Lassell reported a bill, entitled, an act to regulate gates in Kent county,

Which was read the first, and by special order, the second time, and passed.

On motion of Mr. Townsend, the house took up for consideration the resolution submitted by him on the 23d inst. in favor of the heirs and legal representatives of George Lashley, a revolutionary pensioner,

The said resolution was then read the second time and assented to.
