Mr. Dudley presented a petition of sundry citizens of Talbot county, praying the passage of a law to levy a tax upon the venders of carriages in certain cases therein named,

Which was read and referred to the committee already

appointed on that subject.

Mr. Brewer presented a petition of Ann Mudd, widow of Bennet Mudd, a soldier of the revolution, praying for a pension,

Which was read and referred to the committee on pen-

sions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Larrimore presented a petition of Haston Osborn, of Queen Anne's county, praying to be placed on the pension roll of said county,

Which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. McMahon, presented a petition of sundry citizens of Election District No. 1, in Allegany county, praying an alteration in the Magistrates Court law, passed December session 1835,

Which was read and referred to the committee already

appointed on that subject.

Mr. Merrick submitted the following resolution,

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That instead of the sum of nine thousand seven hundred and seventy-five dollars, which by the eleventh section of the act incorporating the Eastern Bank of Baltimore is required to be paid, as a bonus to this State, the said Bank shall be required and allowed to pay to this State, the sum of nine thousand three hundred and seventy-five dollars,

Which was read the first and second time by special or-

der, assented to and sent to the senate.
