BY THE HOUSE OF DELEG ES, NOVEMBER 29, 1779.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MONOURS,

THE proper measures to be adopted to procure speedy and full supplies of flour and forage for the army of the United States; by what mode a quantity of cloathing, blankets, shoes, and other necessaries, can be obtained to furnish the troops from this state; and the recommendation of congress of the 19th instant, to the several states to enact laws for the establishing and carrying into execution a general limitation of prices; are subjects of so great moment, and require such speedy determination, that this house are induced to propose a conserence on those subjects, and should you concur with us in sentiment, we have appointed Messieurs John Hall, John Henry, John Hanson, William Stevenson, Peregrine Lethrbury and Samuel Chase, to join such of your honours as you may judge proper to name for that purpose.
