ORDERED, That the bill for the regulation of prices have a second reading to-morrow three

o'clock in the afternoon.

On considering the report from the committee appointed to enquire into the auditor's office, &c. and the report from the committee appointed to enquire into the state of the gallies, &c. ORDERED, That leave be given to bring in a bill to empower the governor and the council to pay and discharge the officers, mariners, and marines, belonging to the gallies; to authorite the governor and the council to sell at public sale the gallies, and such part of the navel stores as they may think proper; to sell at public sale such of the military stores as they may think superfluous and not necessary for the use of the militia; to sell the salt-pans or kettles, or saltpetre in the public stores, or in the hands of contractors; to authorise the governor and council to incorporate the privates belonging to the artillery companies in Annapolis and Baltimore, with some one of the companies from this state in the continental army; to empower and request the governor and council to discharge the manager of the state tan-yard, and if they think proper to dispose of the said tan-yard is authorise and request the governor and council to discharge, as unnecessary, the two greater-masters, the commissary of stores, the surgeon, and person employed in the victualling-office, and to sell the horse and waggons; and to appoint one or more fit and active persons to take into possession what may remain.

ORDERED, That Mir. J. Hanson and Mr. Sprigg deliver a copy of the report from the committee appointed to enquire into the state of the gallies, &c. to the governor and council, and to request them to cause a particular enquiry to be made into the purchases by, and the issues from, the victualling-office, and to call on the officers or others receiving provisions to render an ac-

count of the expenditure.

ORDERED, That Mr. Chase, Mr. Wilmer, Mr. Williamson, Mr. Lethrbury, and Mr. M'Mechin, do prepare: a bill to empower the governor and council to sell the public property.
