

F R I D A Y, December 24, 1779.

THE house met. As on yesterday, except Mr. H. Ridgely. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act calling out of circulation certain bills of credit emitted by acts of Assembly, read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by Mr. Deye and Mr. W. Stevenson.

The engrossed bills, from No. 18 to No. 27 inclusive, with the paper bills thereof, sent to the senate by Mr. Barnes and Mr. Maccubbin.

The question was then put on £. 8000 per annum. Carried in the negative.

The question was then put on £. 9000 per annum. Carried in the negative.

On motion, The question was put, That it is the opinion of this house, that the chancellor reside at the seat of government for the dispatch of business, and that a salary proportionable to his expences and the dignity of the office be allowed him, if he resides there?
