Matthew Tilghman, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the paper No. 1 to 32, severally endorsed; "By the senate, December 27, 1779: The engrossed of this the original, read and assented to."

ORDERED, That eighty copies of the act, entitled, An act for the immediate relief of flour and other provisions for the army, be immediately printed.

Matthew Tilghman and Charles Carroll of Carrollton, Esquires, from the senate, inform Mr. Speaker, that the governor is waiting in the senate, in order to sign and seal some laws which have passed this session of assembly. Mr. Speaker, attended by the members, went to the senate, where the governor, in presence of both houses, signed and sealed the following laws, viz.

- No. 1. An act concerning nonjurors.
- No. 2. An act for the relief of the reverend Francis Lauder.
- No. 3. An act for the relief of Anna Maria Ringgold, of Kent county, widow.
- No. 4. An act to prevent the raising of geese and swine in the town of Caswell.
- No. 5. An act for the furtherance of justice in a particular cause.
- No. 6. An act relating to the county courts of Caroline county.
- No. 7. A supplement to the act for the establishment of select vestries.
- No. 8. An act for the erecting new warehouses in the town of Bladenburg.
- No. 9. An act for the relief of the reverend Thomas Brown, of Dorset county, and the reverend Joseph Messenger, of Saint Mary's county.
- No. 10. An act to explain the several acts of assembly heretofore made relative to the enrollment of deeds.
- No. 11. An act to enable the corporation of the city of Annapolis to sell certain lands, to lay a further tax on property within the said city and its precincts, to regulate and license ordinaries and retailers of spirituous liquor within the said city and the precincts thereof.
- No. 12. An act to continue the acts of assembly therein mentioned.
- No. 13. An act relating to the Marsh-causeway in Caroline county.
- No. 14. An act relating to public roads.
- No. 15. An act to incorporate the managers of Back-creek school.
- No. 16. An act to prohibit, for a limited time, the exportation of wheat, flour, rye, Indian corn, rice, bread, beef, pork, bacon, live stock, peas, beans, oats, and other victual.
- No. 17. An act for enlarging the powers of the governor and council.
- No. 18. An act for the more effectual preventing forestalling and engrossing, and for other purposes therein mentioned.
- No. 19. An act to enable the justices of Frederick and Montgomery counties to assess a sum of money sufficient to defray the expences of the commissioners in dividing Frederick county.
- No. 20. An act to empower Thomas Harrison to lay out anew and amend the streets, lanes, and alleys, of that part of Baltimore-town commonly called the Marshy-ground.
- No. 21. An act for the relief of Joseph Cowman, of Anne-Arundel county.
- No. 22. An act to empower the vestry of Saint Paul's parish, in Baltimore county, to exchange certain lands with Thomas Harrison, for the use of said parish, and for other purposes therein mentioned.
- No. 23. An act for securing the title of the proprietors of lots and houses in Charles-town, in Charles county.
- No. 24. An act relating to the estates of deceased persons.
- No. 25. An act for the regulation of officers fees.
- No. 26. An act to prevent distilling grain into spirit.
- No. 27. An act for the relief of William Whetcroft, of the city of Annapolis.
- No. 28. An act to empower the governor and the council to sell the public property therein mentioned.
