Total for recruiting the quota of troops of this state in the American army, was read with the proposed amendments, the amendments agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

On motion, RESOLVED, That the recruring officers belonging to the Maryland line, who were sent from camp at the request of the governor and council last spring, have their reafonable expences allowed them while on that dity, and that the auditor-general be empowered to audit, adjust and pass the said accounts.

Resolved, That the principal clerk to the auditor-general be authorised and empowered, in necessary absence or sickness of the auditor-general, to audit, examine, state, and pais, any

public account not exceeding two thousand pourds.

The morials of Thomas Brooke Hodgein, Elie Vallette, and William Hyde, read a second time with the report thereon, and the report concurred with. RESOLVED, That an allowance of five hundred pounds be made to the register of the land-of-

fice, for alphabetically and methodically arranging the books and papers belonging to that office. The following was ordered to be entered as the resolve of this house:

Whereas by the resolution of the 15th of August last (on commodere Grason's memorial) it was intended to augment and increase the pay of the officers and failors in the service of this state on the establishment of the 21st of April, 1778, for the regulation of the pay aforesaid; and whereas it is represented, that by the resolution of the 15th of August last, the pay of the officers and sailors has been greatly diminished, contrary to the intent and meaning of the general affembly; and whereas the commodore hath, fince the passage of the resolution ast aforesaid, paid off and discharged several of the men, according to the resolution of the 21st of April, 1778, confidin - in the interposition of the legislature; and it being just and reasonable, that the commodore should be indemnified: Therefore RESOLVED, The commodore be allowed in his account for the monies paid by him to the several sailors paid off and discharged as aforesaid.

RESOLVED, That there be an addition of fifty per cent. to the pay of the officers and failors on the establishment made on the 21st of April, 1778, and that when the officers and sailors now in the service of the state shall be paid off, the same shall be done according to this resolution, and

the pay aforesaid in commence on the 15th of August last.

On motion, the question was put, That 200 per cent. in addition to the former allowances of the civil officers in this state, be allowed. Carried in the negative.

The question was then put on 150 per cent. Resolved in the affirmative. Mr. Sprigg brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

YOUR committee, appointed to enquire into the account of Mr. John Bullen, beg leave to report, that it appears to your committee, that that part of the account which relates to the wood purchased for the use of the barracks is just;". That it also appears to your committee, that Mr. Bullen, as quarter-master, ought to have rendered an account of the forage purchased for the state horses under his care, but as no such account appears, your committe are at a loss to say exactly what sum he ought to be allowed for the borses, but suppose that six hundred pounds may be a sufficient sum. All which is submitted to the nonourable house.
