late to the aling out of circulation the emissions of November, 1800, and November, 1723. We are in hopes of your affent, at the next session, to a bill for that purpose, and have no Jount of explaining to your fatisfaction the reason and policy of the measure. As no immediate ill consequence can probably arise to the public from the delay, we agree to refer the further consideration or the subject to the next lesson.

We are very anxious to obtain your honours affent to that part of cour bitte hich calls out of circulation the emission of November, 1766, and have agreed to the reverse-amendments proposed on that head, except the time appointed after which that emission shall not be redeemed, and your provision, that the endorser of the bills drawn shall nill be answerable; and w sh your

honours to reconsider those amendments.

We think the first of June will be sufficient time for the holders of the bills to bring them in. We are latished the far greater part of the bills are in the hands of the disaffected, in this and the neighbouring states. If the time be extended to the first of September next, they will then probably be able to form a judgment of the continuance or event of the war, and the election at that rime may be against, but cannot possibly be for, the interest of this state. We are soformed the states of New-Jersey and Pennsylvania did not allow above four months for calling out of circulation the emissions under their old government.

We cannot discover why an endorser should not be liable; if he inclines to be exempt from any damage, he may make his endorsement on that condition, but it will certainly add to the credit of the bills, and promote their sale, if he may be liable, and should so elect. We do not ofteem this matter material, and, if your honours adhere to that amindment, it will not prevent

the passage of the bill.

THE committee have examined the stadt-house throughout, and are of oul in that man parts thereof are finished with more elegance than was required by the contract, particularly the front door, great hall, and court, the senate house and house of assembly, the president's and speaker's seats, and the galleries. The other parts of the wilding appear to be some in a masterly and workmanlike manner, except the upper floor over the senate house, which is indifferent. The roof covered with cypress shingles, and are very good of that kind. I hat part of the dome being unshingled, the same appears to be receiving damage, and are of opinion the said part ought to be shingled and made secure. The repository for the proceedings of the court of appeals, and for the armoury, unfinished; a small part of the plaistering in the parapet unfinished; a door for the cellar, a trap-door on the roof, wanting; allo about half the window-strutters (although put up) are unhung, and although the chimneys are finished, yet the marble jambs and flabs are wanting.

Your committee are informed by Mr. Wallace, the contractor, that the roof was covered wit copper in 1774, which was blown off in September following by a storm, and so damaged ar spoiled, as to render it unfit for further ule, therefore sold by the contractor, as, by his memo,
