Joseph Smith, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of certain nonjurors, thus endorsed; "By the senate, December 29, 1779: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to increase the salaries of inspectors and the rent of warehouses. Ordered, That Mr. Chase and Mr. Key do prepare and bring in the same.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to increase the allowance of justices of the peace and jurymen; and a bill to increase the allowances of witnesses and the fees of constables. Ordered, That Mr. M'Mechin and Mr. Leithbury do prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Leithbury brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the said bills; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Bruitt delivers to Mr. Speaker the two following resolutions;

The house to take into consideration the salaries to be allowed the civil officers of this state, and on motion Resolved, That his excellency the governor of this state be allowed for the ensuing year £. 3000. The chancellor 12,500. The treasurer of the western shore 15,000. The treasurer's deputy 7500. The treasurer's clerk 5000. The judges of the general court, each 9000. The judge of the court of appeals, each 3000. The auditor-general 12,500. The auditor's clerk 7500. The clerks of the council, each 5000. The council, each per day 20. The treasurer of the eastern shore 4000. The judge of the court of admiralty 3000. The clerks of the two houses, each 2000. The messenger to the governor and council 1500.

Which this house have heretofore pledged their faith to make some compensation to the several civil officers of this state, for past services:
