

May the Committee agree to take into Consideration the Letter of his Excellency the Governor of the 10<sup>th</sup> Instant, and also the Letter of General Smallwood of the 20<sup>th</sup> of February last.

Your Committee have taken the above Letter into Consideration, and beg leave to report to the Honorable House, that as we already have an Office of this State by whom all Payments to be made to Congress for an Quota of the continental Expence, always heretofore have been and still may be made, we think it unnecessary, and therefore improper, to appoint an Office for that special Purpose. —

Your Committee are of Opinion, that the Governor and Council ought to be authorized and empowered to exchange all such sums of Money of the Comptrollers of May 1777, and April 11<sup>th</sup> 1778, as have issued out of the Treasury of this State for Presents to the Maryland Officers or the Staff, or pay the State Bounty to the Nine Months Men who enlisted in that Service.

As General Smallwood expresses his Doubts whether the Staff, or what Part in the Maryland Line, under the Resolution of the 11<sup>th</sup> of December last, were entitled to the Present of One hundred and fifty Pounds, made to the Maryland Officers and Staff by the Resolution aforesaid; and also doubts what Part of the Officers in the German and Rawlings's Regiments are entitled to the said Present; Your Committee beg leave to express it as their Opinion, that under the Resolution aforesaid the whole of the Staff then in actual service in the Maryland Line were comprehended, and consequently that the whole of them are entitled to the same Present.

As the German and Rawlings's Regiments were not at the Time of entering into the aforesaid Resolution of 11<sup>th</sup> December considered as a part of the Maryland Line, your Committee are of Opinion they cannot be comprehended within the same. Resolved, That the Governor and Council be authorized to exchange all Bills of the Comptrollers of 20<sup>th</sup> May 1777, and 11<sup>th</sup> April 1778, that have issued out of the Treasury of this State, in Payment of public Debts, or for the Purchase of Provisions for this State, or for Presents to the Maryland Officers & Staff, or to pay the Bounty to the Nine Months Men who enlisted in that Service, and make good the same out of the Money of other Comptrollers in the Western Shore Treasury; provided such Bills of the Comptrollers of the 20<sup>th</sup> May 1777, and 11<sup>th</sup> April 1778 be exchanged over before the 20<sup>th</sup> Day of May next
