He herewith lay before you an Inventory of Goods now in the Commissary's Hands N^o. 6, as likewise an
Account of the Goods by him delivered from the 2d. of June, 1779, to the 2d. of November, 1779, as per
his Account N^o. 7, as likewise a list of Balances due the State from the 2d. of June, 1779, to the 2d. of
November, 1779 as per Account N^o. 8, which was submitted to the Consideration of the Legislature.
Your Committee further report as their Opinion, that the Commissary of Stores shall be directed to dispose
of the Salt Peter on Hand, and that Instructions should be given him, what ought to be done with the
Machinery of Lancaster in his Care, the Proprietor unknown.

Your Committee further beg leave to report, that the Auditor General should be engaged to call on
the several Commissaries to settle and audit their Books of Accounts.

Your Committee are of Opinion, that your present Auditor General, considering the present State
that the Books were in at the Time he was appointed of his Appointment, hath done his Duty, and
should therefore be thanked for his services; and that if it please the Legislature to continue him in that Office, he ought to have a liberal Salary,
as the Business that will more particularly attend that Department will be attended with considerable
Difficulty and Trouble. All which is submitted to the Honourable House.

At a Conference agreed to by the two Houses of Assembly, for the Purpose of considering the proper
Measures to be adopted to procure speedy and full Supply of Flour and Storage for the Army of
the United States, by which means a Quantity of Clothing, Blankets, Shoes, and other
Provisions, can be obtained to furnish the Troops of this State and the Recommendation
of Congress of the 19th of November to enact Laws for the establishing and carrying into
Execution a general Limitation of Prices.

Your Conference appointed for the above purpose, have agreed to the following Propri-
ties, and submit the same to the Consideration of the General Assembly.

1. That it would be improper at this present Session of Assembly, to enact Laws enter-
taining and carrying into Execution a general Limitation of the Price of Country Produce,
common Labour, the wages of Tradesmen, Mechanics and foreign Merchandise agree-
able to the Resolution of Congress of the 19th of November 1779. But altho' your Conference
are of Opinion, that it would be highly inconvenient to, and bear hard on, the Inhabitants
of this State, to frame Laws for a general Regulation of Prices, to have Effect, before it is
ascertained that the several States in the Union will adopt similar Measures; yet they would
beg leave to recommend to the General Assembly that Commissioners be appointed to meet
Commissioners, appointed by the Legislatures of the several States of New Hampshire, Massa-
chusetts, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey,
Pennsylvania, Delaware and Virginia, at the City of Philadelphia, on the first Wednesday of
January,
