The House met (Prayes said on yesterday.) The Proceedings of Yesterday were read,
The Petition of David George read the second time, and referred to Mr. H. M. P. Judge, Mr.
Macomb and Mr. Washington, who are appointed a Committee to consider & report thereon.
The Bill, entitled An Act for the erecting New Hampshire in the Town of Bladensburg, read the
second time by special Order and passed.

Mr. Strickler brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a Report from the Committee appointed to consider
the Petition of the People called Quakers; which was read and ordered to lie on the Table.

The Memorial of William Gibson, Clerk of Baltimore County, was read the second time, and referred
to Mr. John Henry, Mr. Macomb, Mr. Alexander, and Mr. Tracy who are appointed a Committee to
consider & report thereon.

The Petition of Benjamin Cawood jun. Sheriff and Collector of Charles County, was read the second
time and rejected.

Mr. Reed, brings in & delivers to Mr. Speaker at 3^o a Bill, entitled, An Act for the Relief of the Reverend
Thomas Brown, of Dorset County, and the Cleveland Joseph a Messenger of Saint Mary's County,
which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the Table.

The Report on the Petition of Joseph Cowman read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to
bring in a Bill for the Relief of the said Joseph Cowman, agreeable to the prayer of the Petition.

Mr. W. Stevenson, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a Report from the Committee appointed
to enquire into the Conduct of Purchasers of

By the Committee appointed to enquire into and report the Names of the Persons licensed
by the Governor and the Council, as Commissary General, or Quarter Master General, or as Deputy
to either, to purchase Provisions within this State, and into their Conduct, and into the Quantity of
Wheat, Flour, or Corn, purchased for publick Use, and the Prices given; and further to enquire, if any
Abuses have been committed by any Person purchasing Wheat without License, or by Millers or
others, under Colour of purchasing the same for Sale to the Inhabitants.

Your Committee beg Leave to report, that a Number of Persons have been licensed by the Governor
and Council to purchase Provisions in this State for the Army of the United States, under the Act of
Assembly for the more effectual preventing forestalling and engrofing as will appear by the
Paper No. 1, herewith delivered in. It appears to your Committee, by Letters from Col. Blaine,
deputy Commissary General for the Middle Department, and Information of Conrad Theodore
Wederstrand, Assistant Commissary of Purchases, herewith delivered in N^o 5 and 18, that
said Wederstrand in regard to the Purchases he has made, has conducted himself according
to the Directions he from Time to Time received from said Col. Blaine, except as to the
mission of 500 Bushels given to his Deputy, on which Head Col. Blaine has been silent, and
which your Committee apprehend is not usually allowed by the Commissary General. It
further appears to your Committee, that Mr. Wederstrand has employed several Millers,
and furnished some of them with Money to purchase Wheat and manufacture into flour,
and that Messrs. Samuel Mc Gee and Woolman Gibon the 3^d Millers, are to have the one
tenth Part of all the Wheat they purchase for their Commission and Double in manufac-
ture, and are to deliver one hundred and twelve bushels of flour (all the Ship, Ship staves
and Draw) for every three Bushels of Wheat of the remaining to be then respectively
