Sir
We received your letter of the 11th Inst advising us what price Sulphur bears in your County. We do not think ourselves authorized to exceed the price ascertained by the late Convention, which was 6^d per lb, therefore have to inform you, we cannot advise the purchase of it at 8^d per lb.

We hope to have a powder mill erected early this Spring and as we must depend on our own works for a supply of Oalt Petre, are anxious to know how much we have already in the Province and what it may reasonably be presumed we may expect to be provided with by the middle or last of April and therefore request you will immediately inform us of the quantity of crude nitre you have made and what you can supply per week. We have great dependance on your works from your abilities and fidelity and the sum of money furnished you by the former Council of Safety to carry it on extensively.

Gentlemen

The great difficulty we find in providing Blankets for the regular troops raised for the defence of this Province obliges us to apply to the Committees of Observations for the several Counties earnestly requesting that they would use their endeavours to procure from the House Keepers in their respective Counties all the Blankets or Rugs that they can with any Convenience spare for which the Council will pay such price as the Committee shall agree on as well as any expence that may arise in collecting them together and when you have procured any they you will send them to Annapolis to Col. Smallwood or in his absence to the Commanding officer on the Station who will receive the same and give orders to the Council for the payment thereof. We hope that the friends to our cause in your County will contribute every thing in their power to the comfortable subsistence of the soldier in this respect. It will be an act of great humanity and undesign'd essential service to the Public.
