Hellingworth to convey from Newbridge to the Head of Elk one hundred half barrels of powder belonging to our Province & to send the same to your care, when it arrives be pleased to store it in the new Magazine - We think it would be prudent to remove a considerable part of powder that is now stored in Baltimore in the same place, as it may be dangerous to keep large quantities of that article within reach of the enemy.
