Hall the commissions for your Subalterns. & request that you will march for Philadelphia as soon as you are ready and then apply to Congress for further orders. You will be supplied with Barracks as soon as you arrive at the camp as we are informed that Barracks are erecting there with the greatest expedition for the reception of the Soldiers now stationed there who are expected reinforce the army.
