

General Committee of Observation for the County aforesaid to call all evidence
before them who may be called, & cited, can give the proper information respecting a Report
that prevails of Mr Christopher Lunde having cleared out a Brig from this Province
for Barbadoes with Provisions that were thrown into the hands of some of the Officers of
His Majesty's Ships of War for the purpose of supplying the Army under the command
of General George, this Committee summoned before them Wm John Tolson aged sixteen
years of good Reputation, who being born on the Holy Evangel, of Almighty God
before whose Harbours one of the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietors Justices of the Peace
for Prince George County, Deposes and sayeth, that on or about the twentieth
day of May last he sailed from Alexandria on Board the Brig Narratt, Captain
William Scott belonging to the said Christopher Lunde, and that he went passenger
on board of her to the Island of Barbadoes, where she discharged her cargo, and
that to his the said Depository knowledge she did not discharge or dispose of any
part of it till she arrived in the Roads of Barbadoes, and that no part of the said
Cargo was put into the hands of any Officer of His Majesty's Ships of War for the
purpose of supplying them, or the Army under the command of General George.
This Depoent likewise sayeth that in Hampton Roads, on their way out they
were bounded by some people who said they belonged to a Vessel of War who took one
of the hands from the said Brig, and this Depoent sayeth no more.

Richmond in Virg July 27. 1775.

The Convention of Delegates for this Colony now sitting, have almost unanimously
come to the inclosed Resolution for Stopping the Exportation of all kinds of Provi-
sion after the 5th day of next month.

At a Time when the most secret arts are practising to furnish our Enemies
with the means of protracting the unhappy Dispute with the Mother Country, the
necessity of adopting this measure appeared so evident that this Colony have chearfully
sacrificed a very considerable part of its property by agreeing to this Resolution.

I am directed to transmit the Resolution to you as early as possible, & have
no doubt but you will as chearfully come to a similar one.

Resolved.

(In Convention Monday July 24th 1775.)

That no flour, wheat or other grain, or provisions of any kind be exported
from this Colony to any part of the World, from and after the fifth day of August next, until
the Convention or Assembly of this Colony, or the Honorable the Continental Congress shall
