

By the Council of Safety.

All persons who are desirous to contract for supplying the Troops raised in this Province with the various allowances by the late Convention are requested to attend the Council of Safety at the City of Annapolis on the 15 Day of February next and deliver in their proposals which will be duly attended to. At Boston as settled by the Convention to consist of

Ordered, That 100 Hand Bills of the same be immediately printed.

The Province attended the Council and reported that according to the requisition of yesterday the Committee had appointed persons for the purposes therein mentioned.

Instructions and sailing orders were given to Capt. John Martin of the Brig Friendship.

Mr. William Liss was requested to purchase up for the use of the Troops in this Province, all the coarse Cloths in Baltimore Town; also blankets and plush for breeches, and make report of the quantity and price to the Council of Safety with all convenient speed.

Mr. Liss delivered to the Council the following propositions.

The Pilot Boat Chatham is bound for Patria with money to purchase goods to the amount of £3000, or more to the Consignment of Mr. Thomas Russell who goes out in her. The Boat is valued at £300 and each shipper is to pay in proportion to the amount of his property, in case she is lost. Mr. Russell will take one hundred bands light flour on account of the Province at 6/- per band and they to pay them proportion of the value of the vessel in case of loss.

Stone, 4 pounders all good except one which had lost a Trunnion, might be made serviceable by having Trunnions fixed on the outside with an Iron Hoop.
