We doubt our own People would be more  
asham'd, than they are already, in case the instructions  
should be suppress'd - and perhaps it would be said in the  
next General Assembly, that we contraven'd the order of  
Convention, directing the publication of these Instructions  
amongst the other Proceedings - we wish to hear from you  
on the subject, and in the mean Time we will consider  
what is best to be done, and wait for a full Board,  
and until we hear further from you.

Thus far we had rec'd Letters  
we received the last Resolves of Congress, and Letters from  
Mr. Chafe, and our Commissioners of the Post, all difficult
