Sir, We received yours of the 20th instant by Friday's Post, and at
the same time a Resolves of Congress for marching the militia of
Baltimore, Harford, Cecil, and such other Counties, as we may think proper,
we are making out Requisitions from Calvert, P. George, Kent and L. Anne's
Counties, how many will turn out, we know not, we fear not a great many
we intend that you should have the command of the whole; as they go
up to Camp, or the neighbourhood thereof. — We observe what you say
about the arms, and give you full Power, and Authority to bring away all
the arms left by the Flying Camp, provided you can get such, as are
good, we are sensible of the great use those arms may be of to the State,
and that no money can be equal to their Value; but if only a small
